




SATs with a Smile





Key stage 2 tests

The statutory [key stage 2 tests](#) are timetabled from Monday 11 May to Thursday 14 May 2026:

Date	Activity
Monday 11 May 2026	English grammar, punctuation and spelling Papers 1 and 2
Tuesday 12 May 2026	English reading
Wednesday 13 May 2026	Mathematics Papers 1 and 2
Thursday 14 May 2026	Mathematics Paper 3

There is no test for writing – this remains teacher assessed.

What happens during SATs week?



Children will be invited into school early for breakfast.

Time to prepare resources and settle down before SATs begin. Children will be provided with resources.

No 'good luck' items please!

Tests start from around 9am – they will be finished before break each day.

Normal lessons in the afternoon (less intense continuation of foundation curriculum subjects).

If your child is ill, please phone the school office/email as soon as possible.

How are SATs marked?



Every pupil receives a scaled score for Reading, Grammar/Spelling and Maths.

Each child's raw score in the test is turned into a scaled score.

A scaled score of 100 means the child is working 'at the expected standard' for a Year 6 child.

The scale will have a lower point of 80 and a higher point of 120.

The tests reflect the new curriculum introduced in 2014.

Scores are reported to secondary schools.

3. Identify the key question words.
4. Questions go in chronological order
5. If it is a 'why' question, answer with because
6. Find and copy means find and copy
7. If the question is in italics, it is directly from the text.
8. With multiple choice questions, use process of elimination.
9. When it says tick one, TICK ONE!
10. 3-mark questions use P.E.E. – Point, Explanation, Evidence
11. When ordering, go back and highlight the sections of the text before filling in the boxes.





Strategies we are using in school



- Regular mini quizzes that help revise concepts and skills already taught.
- Thinking starter booklets which recap spelling, grammar and arithmetic.
- 1-5 challenges in maths each day and weekly arithmetic.
- Test techniques.
- Homework – CGP.
- Small group intervention – short term boost to plug gaps.
- Full SATs papers to build stamina and identify gaps/weaknesses (once a half term).
- Mock SATs week.
- A broad and balanced curriculum.



Strategies you can use at home



- Read every day (with a particular focus on vocabulary).
- Read a variety of genres.
- Practise times tables to assist with speed and fluency (Times Tables Rock Stars).
- Continue to recap areas of arithmetic (sites such as MathsBot will generate a set of arithmetic questions).
- Go over weekly spelling rules (Spelling Shed) and the 100 words from the Year 5/6 spelling list.
- Continue to support homework tasks.
- Support with any additional tasks your child would like to do.
- Celebrate mistakes and use them as learning opportunities.
- Make sure your child still has time to relax at home and not overdo the learning.





- **Maths** – arithmetic videos and additional helpful strategies
- **Spelling** – clues/mnemonic and rules
- **Grammar** – clues and handbook


